Following

Shadow: to go everywhere that somebody else goes in order to watch what they are doing, especially secretly

Coy: 1. annoyingly reluctant to make a commitment or to divulge something 2. pretending, in a teasing or provocative way, to be reserved or modest 3. shy or reserved in social situations

Futon: a firm Japanese-style cotton-covered mattress used as a seat or bed, either on the floor or on a wooden frame

Trinket: a small object of little value, e.g. an ornament or piece of jewelry

Cracker: a cardboard tube, containing a party favor, and wrapped in colored paper, that opens with an explosive noise when both its ends are pulled

Saucy: intended to be amusingly vulgar, especially in sexual innuendo

On the hop: unawares or unprepared

Reckon: to suppose something to be true

Fool around: to participate in casual or illicit sexual relationships

Pound of flesh: something that is one's legal right but is an unreasonable demand (especially in the phrase **to have one's pound of flesh**)

Burgle: to burglarize

Waistband: a band of fabric that circles the waist at the top of a garment such as a skirt or pair of pants

Dole: a regular sum of money paid by the government to somebody who is unemployed

Scrounge: to acquire something from somebody by begging or borrowing without intending to make repayment or return

Fence: to buy or sell stolen goods

Alcove: 1. a recess in the wall of a room 2. a recess in an exterior wall, usually with a roof or other covering structure 3. a shady or secluded place in a garden

Pop in: to pay a visit in an impromptu manner

Tea towel: a dishtowel

Indifferent: average or low in quality

Twat: a highly offensive term for somebody regarded as unintelligent, in theworthless, or detestable

Lift: to steal something or take something away without the owner's permission or knowledge

Pull in: to arrest somebody, or take somebody into a police station for questioning

Peeper: somebody who looks secretly at somebody or something

Turn over: to break into a building or premises and steal anything thought to be valuable

Pocahontas: a Native American woman

Gideon Bible: a Bible purchased by members of a Christian organization (Gideons) and placed in a hotel room, hospital ward, etc.

Hippocampus: a curved ridge of tissue in each cerebral hemisphere of the brain, concerned with basic drives, emotions, and short-term memory and forming part of the limbic system

Check into: to investigate something in order to get more information about it or to establish its truth or accuracy

Anterograde effective immediately after a traumatic event such as an external shock

Conditioning: a method of controlling or influencing the way people or animals behave or think by using a gradual training process

Quack: somebody who practices medicine without training or a valid license

Get the jump on: to gain an advantage over someone or something, typically by doing something early or ahead of others

In keeping with: consistent with or suitable for something

Chase up: to look for someone or something in a variety of places

Jammed up: in trouble

Crash: to sleep, especially somewhere other than usual when exhausted, or stay temporarily somewhere other than at home

Sap: a weapon such as a blackjack

Call someone's bluff: to challenge someone to give proof of his claims

Bluff: to deceive, mislead, or instill fear or doubt in somebody by a false show of strength or confidence

Snoop: to pry into other people's business or affairs, especially surreptitiously

Dump: an unpleasant or dirty place

Strung out: under the influence of a drug, especially a narcotic drug

Pine: to long for somebody or something, especially somebody or something unattainable

Insomnia

Halibut: a large flatfish. Native to: northern Atlantic, Pacific oceans

Bullpen: an area containing the desks of many white-collar workers, often separated by movable partitions of limited height

Blow over: to no longer excite strong feelings

Herniate: to project through a rupture in the wall of a body cavity, or through a normal or potential opening that has become enlarged

Intracerebral: existing or taking place inside the main part of the brain or cerebrum

Dive: a dirty, shabby, or disreputable bar or club

Calabrese: a variety of green broccoli

Rattle someone's cage: 1. to demand attention; to nag, nudge, or remind 2. to anger or to annoy

Cut: to negotiate an agreement

Fish: to seek something indirectly

Fan out: to spread out in the shape of an open hand-held fan, or spread something out in this way

Vastus: one of the great muscles upon the front of the thigh

Cranky: disagreeable and easily irritated

Patsy: an easily victimized, cheated, or manipulated person

Make something stick: to cause something to be permanent, established, or able to persist

Carry on: to have a casual affair with somebody

Skirting board=baseboard: a narrow board, attached to the base of an interior wall, that covers the joint between the wall and the floor

Hold the fort: to take charge of something in the absence of the person usually responsible

Pack rat: a hoarder of objects

Strung out: tired, tense, or overwrought

Clip: a container for bullets, slotted directly into an automatic firearm

Set: to put a broken bone back in its normal position so it can heal properly

Ninjitsu: a Japanese martial art that emphasizes stealth in movement and camouflage

Manor: 1. a house and the land surrounding it, owned by a medieval noble 2. the residence of the lord or lady of a manor

Presume: to behave so inconsiderately, disrespectfully, or overconfidently as to do something without being entitled or qualified to do it

Bask: to derive great satisfaction or pleasure from something

Elemental: relating to or caused by powerful natural forces

Monofilament: an untwisted continuous single strand of natural or artificial fiber. Use: fishing lines.

Spelunking: the sport or pastime of exploring caves

Cavern: a large underground cave or a large chamber in a series of caves

Cowl: the hood on a monk's cloak, or a monk's hooded cloak

Moonlight: to have a second job in addition to a main job

Enforcer: a member of a criminal gang who uses physical violence to intimidate and enforce compliance

Falafel: a deep-fried ball of ground chickpeas seasoned with onions and spices, originating in Southwest Asia

The worse for wear: 1. in a poor condition because of much use 2. looking or feeling unwell, especially because of being tired

Decadence: a process of decline or decay in a society, especially in its morals 2. the condition of a civilization in decline 3. a state of uninhibited immoral self-indulgence

Prestige, The

Predicament: a difficult, unpleasant, or embarrassing situation from which there is no clear or easy way out

Turn out: to take out the contents of a pocket or bag, usually to check or reorganize what is there

Drop: a trapdoor under a gallows on which somebody who is to be hanged stands

Workhouse: formerly, a publicly run institution in Britain and Ireland in which people living in poverty were given food and accommodations in return for unpaid work

Mount: to organize something such as an exhibition or a production of a play

Sightline: a line of vision between a person and an object, especially between a member of an audience and the stage in a theater

Booking: a contract or arrangement for an entertainer to perform somewhere

Enterprising: showing initiative and a willingness to undertake new, often risky, projects

Wadding: material used to hold powder or shot in a gun or cartridge

Ramrod: a rod for loading a charge into a muzzle-loading musket, cannon, or other gun

Slipknot: 1. a knot that slips easily along the rope or cord around which it is tied 2. a knot that can be unfastened by pulling

Up-and-coming: successful or improving, and showing signs of continuing to do so

Cheap thrill: something providing only short-lived enjoyment or satisfaction

Engagement: a job that lasts for a short period of time, especially one for an entertainer in a club or theater

Fickle: likely to change, especially in affections, intentions, loyalties, or preferences

Bide: to stay, remain, or wait

Effuse: to spread out or radiate from something

Temperamental: unpredictable and erratic in behavior

Rock the boat: to cause a disturbance in the existing situation

Stagehand: a manual worker in a theater, e.g. somebody who sets up and removes stage sets

Iron out: to settle a dispute or resolve a problem by removing difficulties

Vice: 1. an immoral or wicked habit or characteristic 2. immoral conduct 3. criminal activity connected with prostitution and other sexual offenses, gambling, and illegal drugs 4. a mild failing or flaw in somebody's behavior or character

Unheeded: not listened to or given serious attention

Kink: a slight difficulty or holdup in the progress of something

Provenance: 1. the place of origin of something 2. the source and ownership history of a work of art or literature or of an archaeological find

Dark Knight, The

Tootsie=toots: an affectionate or patronizing way of addressing somebody, especially a woman

Oblige: to do something necessary or helpful

Step up: to come forward, e.g. to stand for an office or position or to take responsibility for something

Fall guy: 1. somebody who takes the blame for somebody else's mistake or wrongdoing 2. somebody who is easily tricked or deceived

Right cross: a cross (hook thrown over the opponent's punch) made with the right hand

Floodlight: 1. a large powerful lamp that produces a strong broad beam of light and is used to illuminate the outside of public buildings or sports events at night 2. a broad powerful beam of intense bright light produced artificially

Diligence: the care or attention expected by the law in doing something such as fulfilling the terms of a contract

Prima ballerina: the principal woman dancer in a ballet company

Mantle: 1. a loose sleeveless cloak 2. a role or position, especially one that can be passed from one person to another

Abscond: 1. to run away secretly, especially in order to avoid arrest or prosecution 2. to escape from a place of detention

Droll: amusing in a wry or odd way

Squeeze: an offensive term for a sexual or romantic partner

Tangerine: a citrus fruit with easily peeled orange skin and sweet flesh

Mince: to speak, or say something, in an affectedly dainty way

Port arms: to carry one's personal firearm diagonally in front of the body

Rack up: to accumulate something such as points

Leper: 1. somebody affected with leprosy 2. somebody who is shunned by the rest of society

When the chips are down: at a time of crisis or when vital matters are at stake

Null: amounting to nothing in terms of context or character

Rappel: to descend a steep slope or vertical face using a rope that is secured at the top and passed through a series of coils or a harness around the body

Padded cell: in former times, a room in a psychiatric hospital with its walls and floor covered with padding to prevent a patient from doing himself or herself physical harm

Possessed: having or owning something

Partial: having a liking for something

Versatile: subject to rapid or unpredictable change

Stick in the mud: 1. a person unwilling to participate in activities; a curmudgeon or party pooper 2. more generally, one who is slow, old-fashioned, or unprogressive; an old fogey

Gravity: the seriousness of something considered in terms of its unfavorable consequences

Power of attorney: the legal authority to act for another person in legal and business matters

Authority: a source of reliable information on a subject

Rise to: to behave well in response to a challenge or difficulty

Sod it: a strong exclamation of annoyance

Antechamber: a small room leading into a larger room and often used as a waiting area

Strongroom: a reinforced room designed to withstand fire or theft and used for the storage of valuables

Defibrillator: a machine that administers a controlled electric shock to the chest or heart to correct a critically irregular heartbeat that cannot drive the circulation

Start in: 1. to begin to do something 2. to begin to scold or criticize somebody

Chow: food

Mason jar: a wide-mouthed glass jar with a lid that screws or clips on and forms a vacuum seal, used for preserving food, especially fruits and vegetables

Fence: somebody who buys stolen goods from thieves and then sells the goods

Stiff: a person, especially somebody of a particular type

Age out: to be too old to remain in an age-based classification or receive age-based services

Heli-skiing: skiing in which skiers are transported by helicopter to remote slopes

Hag: an offensive term that deliberately insults a woman's appearance, temperament, and age

Lay on: to provide or arrange something, often in an elaborate or extravagant manner

Practiced: expert in doing something because of long experience

Walk-up: 1.a building of several stories without an elevator 2. an apartment in a building of several stories without an elevator

Collate: 1. to assemble pages in the correct order 2. to bring together pieces of information and compare them in detail

Get into the swing of things: to get into the established rhythm or routine

As I live and breathe: wow! An expression of surprise or amazement.

Cryo-: freezing, cold

Shutter: to close or protect something by means of shutters

Excommunicate: to exclude a baptized Christian from taking part in Communion because of doctrine or moral behavior that is adjudged to offend against God or the Christian community

Rookie: 1. somebody who is new to an activity or job 2. a player, especially a professional athlete, who is in the first year of participation in a sport

Scalp: to resell something quickly or at an inflated price in order to make a quick profit

(Well) what do you know: a phrase used to indicate one's surprise

Sideshow: an action or behavior that is outrageous or bizarre

Take/plead the fifth (amendment): 1. to refuse to testify against oneself in court, in accordance with the right guaranteed by the Fifth Amendment to the United States Constitution, part of the Bill of Rights 2. by extension, to refuse to answer a question or provide information, especially if doing so may incriminate or embarrass oneself

Reckoning: punishment or vengeance for wrongs committed

Uninitiated: having no experience or knowledge of something

Clamber: to climb quickly but awkwardly, using hands and feet

Smoke out: to drive a person or animal from a hiding place by using smoke

Rampart: a defensive fortification made of an earthen embankment, often topped by a low protective wall

Spangle: 1. a small shiny piece of metal or plastic used for decoration on clothing 2. a small sparkling spot or object

Prime: 1. to make something ready for use, or become ready for use 2. to make a firearm ready for use by putting a charge in it 3. to make an explosive ready for use by inserting a fuse

Decadent: 1. undergoing a process of decline or decay, especially in morals 2. showing uninhibitedly or immorally self-indulgent behavior

Dial back: to lessen something, especially in intensity

Vise=vice: a tool with two jaws that can be closed by a lever or screw, used to hold an object immobile so that it can be worked on

Interstellar

Blight: a plant disease, caused by bacteria, fungi, or viruses, in which symptoms range from brownish blotches on the foliage to withering of the entire plant without rotting

Shake a leg: to hurry up: usually used in the imperative

Get a move on: 1. to get started 2. to hurry up

Herbicide: a chemical preparation designed to kill plants, especially weeds, or to inhibit their growth

Okra: 1. a green finger-length seed pod, cooked and eaten as a vegetable or used to thicken soups and stews 2. a tall tropical plant that produces okra pods. Native to: Asia.

Pull one's weight: to do one's fair or proper share of a task

Inseam: the measurement of a pant leg's inner seam

Haywire: 1. functioning erratically, or not functioning at all 2. behaving unpredictably or extravagantly

Doozy: a remarkable or excellent thing

Grunt: a worker who does menial tasks

Fly-by-wire: an aircraft flight control system that has electronic rather than mechanical controls

Trip: a blunder, error, or mistake

Pod: a specialized detachable compartment on a spacecraft, usually for carrying personnel or instruments

Dramamine: a trademark for a motion-sickness medication

Rave: 1. to give praise in a very enthusiastic way 2. to speak or say something in a loud, irrational, or incoherent way 3. to storm and rage with intensity

Forked/chain/jagged lightning: lightning that appears as a jagged line of light splitting into two or more branches near the ground

Discretion: 1. the good judgment and sensitivity needed to avoid embarrassing or upsetting others 2. the freedom or authority to judge something or make a decision about it 3. the ability to keep sensitive information secret

Say it, don't spray it: don't release saliva when you're talking

Gargantuan: tremendously large in amount, number, or size

Cusp: either of the pointed ends of a crescent moon or of any astronomical object appearing with the same curved shape

Egghead: an intellectual or bookish person

Iteration: a process of achieving a desired result by repeating a sequence of steps and successively getting closer to that result

Rivet: a fastener with a head attached to a metal shaft that is passed through a hole in a material and flattened on the other side

Recursive: 1. repeating itself, either indefinitely or until a specific point is reached 2. involving the repeated application of a function to its own values

Granted: used to acknowledge, often reluctantly, the truth of something

Soufflé: a baked or chilled dish that has been made light by adding whisked egg whites. Hot soufflés are usually based on a thick milk sauce and are baked, while cold soufflés are made with gelatin and set by chilling.

Fritter: a cake formed by frying a small amount of a soft batter and often containing chopped fruit, vegetables, or meat

Alkali: a water-soluble chemical that reacts with acids to form salts, has a pH above 7, and turns red litmus paper blue

Dissipate: to fade or disappear, or make something do this

Mount: to put into operation a course of action such as a campaign, rescue, or attack

Scrubber: a device for removing impurities or pollutants from a gas

Squall: a sudden strong wind, often with heavy rain or snow

Blow over: to become less violent

Lockout: an occasion when workers are prevented from entering their workplace, a tactic sometimes used by management in an industrial dispute

Scratch: to make a barely adequate living

Tesseract: the four-dimensional extension of a cube

Dunkirk

Deliverance: rescue from captivity, hardship, or domination by evil

Grenadier: formerly, a soldier armed with grenades

Mole: a massive wall, usually made of stone, that extends into the sea and encloses or protects a harbor

Bowline: a knot used to form a loop that will not slip at the end of a piece of rope

Keep one's eyes peeled: to watch carefully (for)

Gangplank: a movable walkway such as a bridge or plank, used when boarding or disembarking from a ship

Pick off: to shoot somebody or something selected as a target and deliberately aimed at, usually from a distance, or shoot a number of targets one by one

Stuff: an offensive term meaning to have sex with a woman

Dive bomber: a military aircraft designed to release its bombs on a target during a steep dive

 $\mbox{\sc U-boat:}$ a German submarine, especially one used during World Wars I and II

Minesweeper: a ship fitted with equipment for detecting and clearing underwater explosive mines

Bail out: to escape from a plane that is in danger of crashing by making a parachute jump

Get up: to become stronger or more turbulent (refers to winds or the sea)

Spook: to feel frightened or uneasy

Scarper: to leave a place quickly

Sod: used, often humorously or affectionately, to refer to a person

Grouping: 1. a set of people or things gathered into a group 2. the act or process of forming a group or arranging people or things in groups

Jerry: an offensive term for a German person, especially a German soldier in World War II

Sauerkraut: a German dish of shredded cabbage fermented in its own juice with salt

Frog: an offensive term for a French person

Trawler: a boat that is used in trawling for fish

Tiller: the means by which a small boat is steered, consisting of a handle attached to the rudder

See through: to provide somebody with help, advice, and support, especially in times of trouble

Subjugate: to bring somebody, especially a people or nation, under the control of another, e.g. by military conquest

Tenet

Detritus: debris or discarded material

Box up: to pack individual items into boxes

Top dollar: a very high price

Out of one's depth: unable to understand or do something because it is outside the range of your knowledge or skills

Halide: a chemical compound of a halogen with another element or group of atoms

Blimey: used to express amazement or shock

Turnstile: a mechanical barrier designed to let people pass through a narrow opening one at a time between revolving bars

About: on or to the opposite tack

Jibe: 1. to make a fore-and-aft-sail swing across from one side of the boat to the other when sailing with the wind behind, or to swing across in this way 2. to make a fore-and-aft rigged boat change direction by turning the stern across a following wind, or change direction by turning in this way

Singe: to burn something slightly so that only the surface, edge, or tip is affected, or be burned in this way

Pincer movement: a military maneuver that attempts to surround an enemy by simultaneous attack from the front and two side columns that curve around the enemy and back toward each other

Handoff: in football, a handing of the ball to a teammate during play

Dead drop: a location used to secretly pass items between two people, without requiring them to meet

Keep one's end up: do one's part

Ordnance: military weapons, including supplies for their use and equipment for their maintenance

Cavern: a large underground cave or a large chamber in a series of caves

Oppenheimer

Coat: to cover a surface with a thin layer of something

Beaker: a flat-bottomed glass container used in laboratories

Potion: a liquid to be drunk that is medicinal, supposedly magical, or poisonous

Yank=Yankee: somebody who is from the United States

Mesa: a relatively flat elevated area with steep sides that is less extensive than a plateau

Mudbank: an area of mud, possibly submerged, near the edge of a body of water

Take on trust: to accept something without seeing evidence supporting it, by trust or confidence

Cyclotron: a circular particle accelerator in which charged particles are confined by a vertical magnetic field and accelerated by an alternating high-frequency applied voltage. It is used to study the way particles interact.

Deuterium: an isotope of hydrogen that has double the mass of ordinary hydrogen because it contains a neutron in its nucleus. Use: tracer in experiments. Symbol D.

Cock-and-bull story: a ridiculous and scarcely credible story that somebody tries to convince people is true

Draw someone out: to encourage a shy, hostile, or reserved person to talk at length or in detail, or to become more forthcoming in a social or legal situation

Bandy: to toss words back and forth casually, often without caring whether they are true or what effect they may have

Scupper: to wreck, defeat, or ruin something

Dud: a munition that fails to fire or explode

Gallows humor: macabre humor that finds irony or comedy in serious matters such as death

Build up: to increase or develop gradually, or make something do this

Candor: honesty or directness, whether refreshing or distasteful

Evidentiary=evidential: relating to, consisting of, or based on evidence

Upstanding: honest and socially responsible

Colitis: inflammation of the colon, characterized by lower-bowel spasms and upper abdominal cramps

Animus: 1. a feeling or display of animosity 2. an attitude or feeling that motivates somebody's actions

Kangaroo court: an unofficial or mock court set up spontaneously for the purpose of delivering a judgment arrived at in advance, usually one in which a disloyal associate's fate is decided

Scruple: a moral or ethical consideration that tends to restrain action or behavior

Holdout: a person or group that refuses to submit to or comply with a situation, trend, or order

Tar and feather: to smear tar over somebody and cover the tar with feathers as a form of punishment
